# Vermont Conference



**April 4, 2018**

Dear Friends of the Vermont Conference,

Two weeks ago, I invited you all to imagine entering Holy Week walking in the sandals of the disciples.

I think that Palm Sunday was a little easier to imagine this year - the shouting of 'Hosanna - Save us!' - echoed the voices of our young people Marching for their Lives. It echoed the wave of refugees and DACA Dreamers crying 'Save US!' Perhaps it even echoed our cries of 'Save Us' in these days of divisiveness, derision and demonizing.

We've done a bit better at creating liturgies with movement, light, shadow, taste and drama to imagine ourselves present with Jesus' at his last meal - and in the Garden. Yes, we left in silence and darkness - just as the disciples left the Garden. But they were scattering out of fear for their lives. They found places to hide from the authorities. They too were marked men. They too were in danger of being arrested as insurrectionists. Instead, we went about our normal routines on Friday and Saturday - as though nothing unusual was happening at all. It was only after the rumors of an empty tomb that they began to creep out of their hiding places - looking for one another - seeking to huddle together instead of separately - trying to figure out fact from fake news.

Isn't that where we are as well? Did the resurrection really happen? How is that possible? What does it mean? How does it make life any different than it was yesterday?

On Easter Sunday, I worshipped at the United Church of Bethel. And, yes, it was a glorious worship experience. But I was struck when I listened to the reading from Acts 10:34-43. There was Peter speaking to the crowds in Caesarea saying:

...You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ-he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced...how [Jesus] went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God

was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree;...He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead.

I smiled at listening to Peter's proclamation - because it was NOT instantaneous! Just the day before on Holy Saturday, I had gone to the Warren United Church of Christ to experience Bert Marshall sharing 'The Gospel of Mark - LIVE!' From beginning to end I heard the entire Gospel - and what had struck me in that listening was the drumbeat - over and over - of a group of disciples who didn't get it! Didn't understand what Jesus was doing! Or why he was doing it! A group of disciples who didn't agree with his choices at times. And didn't have a clue what his stories meant! And time after time, Jesus expressed his exasperation! They may have been witnesses - but they were not yet understanders. The in Good News was not yet embodied in their souls.

Before Peter and the disciples would be able to be 'witnesses' they would have to re-visit every word and deed that they hadn't gotten the first time around. Before Peter and the disciples would be able to testify to the Christ who was alive and 'with us' always they would have to 'recontextualize' all that they had seen and heard in light of the resurrection.

What a gift it was that the Risen Jesus remained with the doubting and perplexed disciples for those forty days. It was the time they needed to sit again at his feet - to be prepared to become what Jesus had chosen them for at the beginning.

Perhaps - along with the Advent and Lenten Bible Studies - we, like the disciples - need to use 'Eastertide' as an opportunity to engage with the story of Jesus in light of the resurrection. What does it really mean in this world we are living in? What does it mean for our young people, refugees, DACA dreamers? What does it mean for the marginalized, the outcast, the poor, the hungry? And on this day when we remember particularly remember Martin Luther King, Jr - we must remember that God had a dream first of all - God yearns for us all to be free to be all that God created us to be.

And God has called us, the body of Christ, the Church on earth, to be witnesses to God's dream - to testify to God's power to heal broken hearts and lives - and then go out and follow Jesus into the world.

May Eastertide be a time when we are being made ready to truly experience the power of the Holy Spirit.

Dear Friends,

Are you excited yet? I know I am! I can hardly wait for this year's Vermont Conference Annual Meeting. Some of my favorite phrases are "Once upon a time..." "Did you hear about..." "There was this woman who..." "A priest, a rabbi, and an Imam..." These are clues that a story is to follow and nothing communicates better than a good story. This is why I'm so elated. The theme of this year's Annual Meeting, "Sharing Sacred Stories," might just prove to be monumental.

Most every preacher I know is familiar with Frederick Buechner's Telling The Truth, The Gospel As Tragedy, Comedy & Fairy Tale and Benedicta Ward's Sayings of the Desert Fathers. Early on these small volumes inspired me to include stories in my preaching. A good story can delight, challenge and transform the listener. After all, Jesus was the master storyteller himself. His parables continue to inspire and challenge believers and nonbelievers to this day.

This past Sunday I included as part of my Easter sermon the illustration "Sunday's A Coming," made famous by Tony Compolo. (you can find it on Youtube) I first heard him tell this story early in my ministry and since then I have been keenly aware that "a good story well told" is a powerful tool.

At the end of April I'm retiring from the pastoral ministry after thirty-six years of service and two churches, but I'm not retiring from telling stories. At this year's Annual Meeting all of us who attend will have a unique opportunity to improve and hone the skill of storytelling. We live in a turbulent and divisive time. Progressive Christians, more than ever need to share the Good News, as we understand it in effective and powerful ways. Susanne Schmidt, our keynote speaker and facilitator, will share with us her knack for "telling a good story." Our world needs our message. Our world needs healing. Our world needs storytellers.

### Vermont Conference Youth and adults from the Guilford UCC participate in ACT to End Racism (Awaken, Confront, Transform) in Washington DC today.

"After a year of planning, the National Council of Churches is proud to sponsor and organize a movement to ACT NOW to End Racism. The multi-year effort launches with our gathering at the Mall to commemorate the 50th anniversary of Martin Luther King, Jr.'s tragic death," said the Rev. John Dorhauer, UCC general minister and president and co-chair of the NCC's Truth and Racial

## **Justice Task Force. "We fully intend for this to broaden the movement to end racism in our time."**

When she was in middle school Victoria Jaenson wrote a long report on the life and assassination of Martin Luther King Jr. In preparing for this journey she said, "I never imagined I would in Washington DC to mark the 50th anniversary of his death". But she, along with three Brattleboro teens and Rev Lise Sparrow will be there for two days to remember, rally and visit legislators to be sure the MLK Jr legacy will be carried further into legislation and action.

The National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA and other partners, will gather in Washington, D.C. for an historic even to mark 50 years since the assassination of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. on April 4, 1968. They will "commit to do our part to eradicate the entrenched racism that grips the United States and paralyzes our ability to see every human being as equal" and launch a Truth and Racial Justice Initiative.

The five from Brattleboro will represent the Vermont Conference of the United Church of Christ and will take part in a gathering of churches from across the nation to worship, rally and pursue a day of advocacy. Victoria is now a student at Hartford University and is a star at the Hart School of Dance. This Fall she will go to North Carolina to join the Charlotte Ballet Company a significant step toward her lifelong dream of becoming a professional ballet dancer. Pooja Meyer and Lily Quintero will represent the Brattleboro Union High School and Margaret Holland is a student at Athol High School in Athol, Massachusetts. Only Pooja has been to our nations' Capitol before.

Pooja went last year with Rev Sparrow and other youth for the Native Nations March and is excited to take photos of the March. All the young women are former or current members of Guilford Community Church and the Brattleboro Area Interfaith Youth Group (BAIYG), a group of teens from the Brattleboro Area who join together for social service and action.
