from the
Conference

Dear Beloved Community in the Vermont Conference,

I don't know about you, but I am finding that the process of deciding what and when to open and under what circumstances is still stressful. It is stressful just like dealing with this highly contagious disease and like the decisions we made to not be physically together until a safer time. I feel a bit guilty for not being more joyful and relieved that we are finally getting beyond the need for constant vigilance. I AM joyful to reconnect, to hug, to share meals. There are, however still decisions that have to be made and the desires and concerns of others to honor. Further, this hasn't taken away the exhaustion so many are

feeling and replaced those feelings with instant energy. There is mourning to go through though we are not talking about this. Many people are now experiencing delayed grief for loved ones who died during and/or of Covid.

So, this is a reminder to be gentle with yourself and others. Rather than running full steam ahead as in person congregational life begins to return, I believe there is wisdom in starting slowly and giving our bodies, minds and spirits time to rest and heal. Summer offers opportunities for rest and recreation, for a slower pace of life and for doing the things we love like hiking, swimming, kayaking, napping in the hammock, making music, practicing whatever gives us joy.



It will take time to sort out what has happened and what has happened to us so we can together make meaning, be willing to name the losses and be brave enough to say out loud what needs not to be returned to and what else we may be called to. It is only by intent, by not running as fast as we can towards the next thing that the Spirit has the chance to get our attention and speak to our hearts.

Here's hoping that you will have a Spirit/heart/healing/resting and reconnecting time in these summer days.



Remembering Rev. Hal Harrison



Memories of Hal Harrison from the Purintons

Barbara:

I met Hal in 1975-6 when I was at Andover Newton and attended a Christian Education workshop at Silver Lake. When Charlie and I were installed in 1978 as co-pastors at the Second Congregational Church of Jeffersonville, Hal and Betsy gave the sermon. We asked them because they were both pastors and we sought role models in what we were told was a "new model for ministry." Hal and Betsy attended our wedding in Newfane, we still use the ceramic maple syrup pitcher they gave us as a wedding gift.

There followed many years of working with Hal when I was on the Christian Education Department heading various committees. He cared about sharing faith and engaging spiritual seekers of all ages. He was also just a wonderful caring, man who was interested in every little detail. It was special to see him at a Retired Pastors Boundary

Training in early 2020 and to have one more chance to share a hug and a hello.

Charlie:

Hal was part of the triumvirate of Revs. Charles Chamberlain, Conference Minister and Rev. John Nutting, the other Associate Conference Minister; a team that nurtured our co-pastorates. This team modeled leadership, the necessary challenge of congregational leadership, and were a good part of why we are still here!

1969: I first met Hal when I was in 9th grade, at Silver Lake Conference Center in Connecticut. Amid Anti-Vietnam War anthems, Hal embodied peace, and modeled welcome for all of us awkward teens. Certainly my vision of what the church could be was formed in large part during those church camp weeks.

1979: Hal was the supervisor (wrangler? wise elder?) of the summer pastors and VBS cohort, when I interned at Bethany Randolph. Every couple of weeks we would all meet with Hal, (and often Betsy) for fellowship, fun, and support. We had trouble choosing whether we would go out for beer or ice cream cones, but we always loved being with Hal.

1990?: Hal led a Bible study with several hundred people at an Annual Meeting in Rutland. He brilliantly and humbly talked us through Romans 5:3-4, eliciting ideas and insights from all gathered, bringing the text to life in ways that I still remember 30 years later. What a gift!

Hal was an attentive listener, radiant with deep kindness, and cheerful in life and faith. I am so glad he has been a part of my life and my ministry-- for more than 50 years!

If so, the church may be eligible for the employee retention credit, a CARES act provision that has been extended through December 31, 2021! The employee retention credit may provide a church with up to \$7,000 per employee for employees that are not ministers. Learn more.

Peacemakers Pulpit-June 2021

In mid-winter of 2019 and 2020, my daughter joined me in Arizona for wonderful birding and for visits to Arizona-Mexico border missions where we brought needed supplies



donated by Vermonters. We had to postpone travel this year but have kept up with changing situations/needs there, nevertheless.

We worshipped at The Good Shepherd UCC in Sahuarita AZ (https://thegoodshepherducc.org) whose pastor/people have long been concerned about just treatment for those crossing the border. We brought supplies and generous donations from Vermont.

In Cochise County we visited a Presbyterian mission in Douglas AZ. In 2019, we brought supplies for their cross-border children's programs. By 2020, their focus was on families forced to wait for asylum in Mexico. We made a substantial donation from Vermont churches toward that outreach. This spring, Border Patrol was suddenly able to release large numbers of asylum seekers into Douglas where the whole town rallied in amazing ways to "welcome the stranger" and (http://fronteradecristo.org) shifted their focus once again.

In Tucson, the Casa Alitas Catholic Community Services shelter assisted hundreds of asylum seekers in 2019, reached across the border of necessity

in 2020, but welcomed many this spring at their beautiful Tucson shelter. (https://www.ccs-soaz.org) We brought needed basic clothing in 2019, generous checks in 2020, and continue to support their efforts.

In 2020, Episcopalians, the UCC, and ELCA Lutherans – began Cruzando Fronteras (https://fronteras.azdiocese.org) at St. Andrews, Nogales AZ, to create safe shelter in Nogales MX for waiting asylum seekers. With your support, we provided backpacks, sleeping bags, clothing, and toiletries for their cross-border outreach. Now, the program assists folks from that shelter who are finally allowed to join family here.

Political decisions created changing situations for asylum-seekers. Border programs have been adaptive as needs have shifted even since 2019. Support, education, and prayer are needed. AZ programs are grateful to Vermonters for our concern and long-distance help.

A Call to all Racial Justice and Environmental Justice Advocates:

Action on Line 3 Pipeline in Northern Minnesota

Recently, a group of activists in Minnesota, including both Indigenous and Faith Leaders, have put out a call for people of faith to join in opposing the Line 3 Pipeline that Enbridge Corp. is already in the process of building. This Pipeline is expected to carry tar sands oil across sacred Indigenous lands, as well as numerous bodies of water including the headwaters of the Mississippi. While we celebrate the cancelling of the Keystone XL Pipeline, it's time now to step up to oppose this equally destructive project. Both the Minnesota and National offices of Interfaith Power and Light are very much engaged with this issue, as is our own UCC Environmental Justice Ministries office.



****COVID Testing Update****

NEW: Anyone who is fully vaccinated does not need to get a COVID test completed before coming to camp. This applies to volunteers and campers. Everyone will still be tested upon arrival on the mountain, but if you're two weeks or more out from your last dose of a COVID vaccine you no longer need to provide proof of a negative test result within 7 days of arriving!

This means that we will need a copy of your vaccine card or some other way of proving you are fully vaccinated on hand. Please email me a copy of your proof, and have your counselors do the same. If we do not have proof of your vaccination, you will need to get tested within seven days of your arrival at camp.

ALSO if you're 18 or older you could:

COVID 19 FUNERAL ASSISTANCE
